



Lewes Heritage Open Days 6-9 September 2018



Sussex Police HQ (Malling House, Church Lane) is a Grade I listed 17th century building. Tour includes entrance hall and main staircase of 1760, and also a visit to the nearby contact call-centre. Tours Saturday and Sunday, I Oam, midday and 2.30pm. Booking essential on heritage@sussex.pnn.police.uk by 30



Edward Reeves Photography (159 High Street) Established c. 1855, Reeves is believed to be the world's oldest still-existing photographic business. Unique Victorian daylight studio and exhibition of images from the remarkable archive of over 200,000 glass negatives. Open Saturday and Sunday, I Iam-



Fitzroy House (corner of High Street and Friars Walk) Landmark Victorian Gothic building (1862) by Sir George Gilbert Scott, for many years the town library. Rescued from demolition in the 1970s it is now again being refurbished, with the spacious atrium to be used as an arts venue. Open Thursday 10am-4pm



Lewes Prison (Brighton Road) Imposing Victorian buildings with fine brick and flint walls, similar to innovative design at Pentonville. Tours Thursday and Friday, 9.30am and 2pm, max 15 people, security checks on arrival, no bags, cameras or phones on tour. Stairs. Booking essential by I Sept, email leweshod@ gmail.com, max 2 adults per booking, no under 18



St Anne's Church (Western Road) is partly 12th century, the oldest surviving church in Lewes, and Grade I listed. Memorials and stained glass from various periods, and 12th century anchorite's cell. Open Saturday, 10am-5pm, guided tours all day



Bull House (92 High Street) is a Grade II* listed 15th century building. Tom Paine, author of The Rights of Man and an inspiration for the American Revolution, lived here from 1768-74. Open Saturday, tours 10am, 11.30am, 2pm and 3.30pm, max 12 people, book by 3 Sept on website below*



Westgate Chapel (rear of Bull House, High Street) Grade II* listed, part of late 16th century town house, altered for use as a non-conformist chapel. Today a range of community uses, including the Oyster Project charity. Refreshments. Open Saturday, 10am-2pm



Freemasons Hall (149 High Street) is a Grade II 1868 building still owned by the South Saxon Lodge, one of the oldest in Sussex, built on the remains of the medieval Westgate tower. First-floor Temple. To the rear in Pipe Passage, the remains of a Victorian clay-pipe kiln. Open Saturday and Sunday, 10am-4pm



Barbican House (169 High Street) the Sussex Archaeological Society's library and museum. Displays on Humphrey Repton's work and on women in the Society's history; portraits exhibition. Open Friday, 10.30-11.45am, 1.30-3pm and 3.15-4.30pm, max 10 per tour. Book by 5 Sept on library@sussexpast. co.uk or 01273 405738. Support available for visually impaired visitors - indicate when booking



St John sub Castro (Abinger Place) 19th century church recently altered to create multi-functional space for services, musical and community events, meeting rooms and café. Monuments and relics from original medieval church in and around church and churchyard. Tours, exhibition and refreshments. Open Saturday, 9am-5pm



Town Hall (High Street) was rebuilt from the 16th century Star Inn. Medieval vaults, Jacobean staircase, Council Chamber and Mayor's Parlour. Displays of newly-restored paintings and the history of Station Street. Tours Sunday 10am, midday and 2pm, booking essential, in person, by phone 01273 471469, or email mayors.sec@lewes-tc.gov.uk

Trinity House (213 High Street) 1607/8 timberframed building with Georgian façade clad in red mathematical tiles, once the town Armoury and home of the local commander during the Civil War. Tours Saturday 10.15am, 12.15 and 2.30pm, max 15 people, book by 3 Sept on website below*



Harpsichord Workshop (English Passage, off Cliffe High Street). Late 16th century timber-framed building with a crown-post roof, perhaps originally a market hall, extensively rebuilt in 1990 by local architect David Russell. Open Sunday, I Jam-5pm



Jireh Chapel (Malling Street) listed Grade I, dates from 1805, enlarged in 1926. The simple interior has galleries supported on wood columns with corner staircases, plastered vault ceiling, octagonal pulpit and pine box-pews. Open Saturday, 10am-3pm



Lamb House (3 Chapel Hill) Grade II* listed. An opportunity to see the 18th century Chinese lacquer screen rediscovered in this house in the 1960s and restored to its former glory by English Heritage. Open Sunday, 2pm-5pm



Southover Grange (Southover High Street) built in 1572 with Caen stone taken from the demolished Lewes Priory. 16th century fireplaces; main staircase dating from major restoration of 1871. Spacious terrace and garden. Open Sunday, 10am-2pm



Priory School Chapel (Mountfield Road, between Priory School and Sussex Downs College, neither open). The War Memorial chapel (1960) is by Sir Edward Maufe, designer of Guildford Cathedral and several Sussex churches. Its bell came from the former Lewes Naval Prison. Organ recital. Open Saturday, 2pm-5pm, talk at 3pm. Parking
