Lewes House (32 High Street, 19 on map) meeting point for most walks. Open Saturday and Sunday 10am-5pm, with exhibitions by Friends of Lewes and Lewes History Group. Basket-making demonstration and Ovesco eco-homes stand. Tours of the garden, Sunday, 11.30am and 2.30pm (no booking required) by Lewes House Garden Group, who are also providing refreshments Saturday and Sunday.

Lewes Victoria Hospital (Nevill Road) The Lewes Dispensary (1847, later a bank, now Gail's Bakery) moved to this Queen Anne-style building in 1909. Now a community hospital offering a wide range of healthcare services.

Tours Saturday, 10am to 2.30pm, must book, max 6 people each tour



Hugh Rae (74/75 High Street) Part 14th century, one of the town's oldest buildings, now featuring a textile museum. Explore its complex history and past uses as a haberdashers and men's outfitters, plus the history of the Clothkits business in Lewes.

Quaker Meeting House (Friars Walk, entrance in Styles Way) Grade II listed, dating from 1784 with later additions. Original room for Quaker worship remains, with other parts extended and refurbished in 2022-24.

4 Park Road This 1961 house (by Lewes architectural practice John Schwerdt & Partners) has a first-storey addition designed by the present owner Jolyon Brewis.

Open Sunday, 10am to 3pm



flint base of an 1802 corn windmill converted into a private house, briefly owned by Virginia and Leonard Woolf. Ground floor open with displays of historic

Open Saturday, 2pm to 5pm



Freemasons Hall (149 High Street) Grade II 1868 building still owned by the South Saxon Lodge, one of the oldest in Sussex. Built on the remains of the medieval Westgate tower. First floor temple. Open Saturday and Sunday, 10am to 4pm



Bull House (92 High Street) 15th century timber-framed house, once lived in by Thomas Paine, author of The Rights of Man and a key influence in the American War of Independence. Talks on the building's history each day at midday. Open Friday to Sunday, I lam to 3pm



photographic studio and special exhibition. Friday to Sunday, I lam-4pm, plus historic glass-plate photos in windows around town. Nearby, **The Workshop** (164 High Street) Timbered 18th century interior, basement iewellery workshop with historic features. Friday and Saturday, 9.30am-5pm



Trinity House (213 High Street) 1607/8 timberframed building with Georgian facade clad in red mathematical tiles. Once the town armoury and home of the local commander in the Civil War. Tours Saturday, 10.30am and 1pm, must book, max 15 people



Jireh Chapel (Malling Street) Grade I listed chapel dating from 1805, enlarged in 1827, and still in regular use. The simple interior has galleries with corner staircases, plastered vault ceiling, octagonal pulpit and pine box-pews.

Open Friday and Saturday, tours every half hour 10am to midday, no booking needed



Lewes Little Theatre (Lancaster Street) First formed in 1929 as the Lewes Players, the present theatre (since expanded) was converted from a chapel in the late 1930s with the support of John Maynard Keynes. Display about its history in the foyer, plus backstage tours.

Open Saturday, I I am to 4pm

Victorian tower is a local landmark.



W F Bruce (5 North Street) Lewes was home to several fine clockmakers in the 18th and 19th centuries. Visit the historic basement workshop where specialist clock restoration and conservation is undertaken.

St Thomas à Becket Church (Cliffe High Street) Grade II*, probably founded as a chapel soon after the martyr's death in 1170. 14th century nave arcade and 15th century tower. 1670 clock by Ditchling blacksmith lames Looker.

Lamb House (3 Chapel Hill) Grade II* listed. A chance to see the 18th century Chinese lacquer screen rediscovered in the house in the 1960s and restored by English Heritage. Open Sunday, 2pm to 5pm



Priory School Chapel (Mountfield Road, between Priory School and East Sussex College) War memorial chapel (1960) by Edward Maufe, who designed Guildford Cathedral and several Sussex churches. Organ music and bell ringing. Open Sunday, I to 5pm. Parking



Eastgate Baptist Church (Eastgate Street) An earlier meeting house was replaced by the present Norman-style church in 1843. Sunken baptistry below the altar, galleried first floor and helical tower staircase which spirals in two directions.

Harveys (off Cliffe High Street) is the oldest independent brewery in Sussex and its distinctive Tour Sunday midday, must book, max 25 people, meet outside Harveys shop in Cliffe High Street

Tours Friday and Saturday, 11.30am, must book,
